MEMBERSHIP TASK FORCE

As part of our transition process this year, Trinity began to review its membership roll. As we prepared for calling a new permanent pastor, it was important that this roll accurately reflected the active membership of our congregation. Thus, the Transition Team, with approval from the Church Council, established a Membership Task Force to review Trinity's active membership roll to see whether it was a true reflection of the membership.

Our Constitution states, "Membership in this congregation shall be terminated by any of the following: a) death; b) resignation; c) transfer or release; d) disciplinary action by the Congregation Council; or e) removal from the roll due to inactivity as defined in the Bylaws." The Bylaws state, "Membership in this congregation shall be terminated for inactivity when an individual has: a) been inactive for two consecutive calendar years and no longer resides in the area, or b) been inactive for five consecutive calendar years, unless the pastor determines, with the concurrence of the Council, that the individual should be continued as an active member."

In May 2015 the committee, consisting of Thea Lubrecht, Kathy McFarland and Barbara Terreri, began reviewing the membership rolls. As a result, on June 8, 2015 the Council approved the Task Force's recommendation to remove 37 members who were either baptized but not confirmed; baptized and past confirmation age; or had died. Council also approved the Task Force's recommendation that letters be sent to 116 inactive individuals and families to ask whether they considered themselves members of Trinity and would like to remain on our active roll. The first letter, with a stamped pre-addressed post card, was sent on June 24, 2015. Over a period of two months, 20 post cards were returned to Pastor Dan. On August 28, 2015 a second letter was sent to those who did not respond, advising them they would be removed from the active membership roll if we did not receive a response by October 12, 2015, but with the understanding they may re-activate their membership at any time.

On October 12, 2015, Council approved the Task Force's recommendation that 110 active members be removed from the TLC membership roll. As a result of the committee's review, a total of 148 baptized and/or baptized/confirmed members were removed from active membership. At the time of the Congregational Meeting on December 6, 2015, the active membership at Trinity Lutheran Church was 414 baptized members.

It is always difficult to remove an individual or a family from active membership in a congregation, but it is something that we must do on a yearly basis. Many of the families removed already had been living out of state for several years, some individuals had died and never were removed, some had transferred to other congregations, while others responded they no longer wanted to be considered active members.

Trinity is a vibrant congregation of worship and praise, service and ministry. We have much love, support and energy to offer members, but we also look to the hearts and minds, voices and hands of the membership to remain vital to Christ and to the world.

Any members still in the area who wish to reactivate their memberships in the future always will be welcomed with open arms.

MEMBERSHIP COMMITTEE

As part of TLC's two-year transition process, a Membership Task Force was established in 2014 to review the active membership roll and prepare an accurate roll of all active TLC members. That job was completed in 2015, thus making the review and update in 2016 much quicker and easier.

In 2016 we added three new members and removed six adults and six children due to transfers, personal requests or death.

As of December 31, 2016, there were 414 baptized members on the membership roll of TLC, of whom 317 are active, confirmed voting members.

Trinity continues to be a vibrant congregation of worship and praise, service and ministry. We have much love, support and energy to offer members, and we look forward to an uplifting 2017 with the addition of our permanent pastor, Fred Becker.

In addition, here are some highlights of Council's activities during 2016:

- Prayerfully considered and discussed, on a monthly basis, worship attendance and giving. We encourage all TLC
 members to come together each Sunday for worship and fellowship, and to enroll in electronic giving. It's a
 process that takes just a few minutes to set up, but then makes it so much easier to commit to your monthly
 pledge!
- Approval of new members.
- Review and acceptance of work of the Transition Team, including the development of the Ministry Site Profile, a key component of the call process.
- Creation of the "Help Wanted" board in the narthex a fantastic way to get involved in the various ministries of TLC.
- Oversight of the organ refurbishment plan
 - Many thanks to all who contributed to the fund achieving our goal of raising the full cost of the refurbishment!
- Many, many projects around the facility. Managing this aging building can be a challenge, but we thank God for the tireless efforts of the Property Committee and "Silver Foxes."
- Approval of two confirmands.
- Gratefully received donation from the Morris County Mental Health Association to provide air conditioning in the Parish Life Center.

- Provided guidance to the team reviewing the Constitution and Bylaws.
- Assured the transition of the role of Superintendent of Sunday School with heartfelt appreciation for Sandie Knowle's tenure and gratitude for Lynda Pullis's willingness to serve!
- Approved the refurbishment of the handbells and purchase of new cases, to be funded through the MAT account.
- Renegotiated the agreement for maintenance and testing of the fire suppression and extinguishing system.
- Guided the re-energizing of the TLC committee structure and appointed Council liaisons to each committee.
- Managed the transition from our interim pastor, Dan Schroeder, to our called pastor, Fred Becker. We give thanks to God for both of these spiritual leaders, and to our Bishop and her staff for their support throughout this process.
- Consistent with the revisions to the Constitution and Bylaws, the Council elected the following leaders for the 2017 calendar year:

CELEBRATION CHOIR

We have even ventured out of the choir loft for several of our anthems, one even sung a cappella! Our sincere appreciation to Julie Sauder, our talented/dedicated accompanist, to Kevin Seidel, our fearless/tireless director (who has wonderful taste in selecting anthems that have quality music and texts), Jody Seidel for carrying out organizational duties, and last but not least, our very loyal and hard-working choir members. Our numbers fluctuate in both directions due to health, travel, family obligations, etc., but we are always looking for new members. We hear terrific voices from within the congregation, and the invitation is always extended to all who would like to join us. Choir members find their participation very rewarding, enjoyable, and faith-building.

PICK-UP CHOIR

The Cradle Roll is a ministry to parents of children from birth to three years of age. During these first three years, letters are sent quarterly to the parents, giving information from a Christian perspective about the physical and social development of the child, and listing games and other activities for the child. He or she is remembered with a card on the anniversary of his or her baptism.

At the end of 2016, two children were on the Cradle Roll, a very helpful ministry to the parents that enables them to begin Christian education at home, even before the child starts Sunday Church School. It is the first step in the ongoing Christian education that continues throughout life.

PARISH NURSE REPORT

Parish Nursing and Health Ministry continue to be an integral part of Trinity Lutheran Church's mission. Health ministry encourages active participation of all members, and without that assistance, we would not be able to reach out in Christian love, caring and support to those with health care needs.

It has been a year of transition, and I continued to work closely with Pastor Dan to evaluate and meet the health care needs of the congregation until he left the end of October. I continued to communicate with Kathy about health care needs and met them, until Pastor Fred started in November. Pastor Fred and I met his first week to discuss expectations, needs and how we can best meet them together as a team.

Health Ministry offered two new programs this year: A Mental Health First Aid course; and a Senior Health Fair, spearheaded by Mabel Roy of senior ministry, and planned together. Both programs were well attended and received. We also continued with some programs that have been successful in the past: Blood Drives (twice this year), blood pressure screenings once or twice a month on Sunday mornings, and "The File of Life."

As parish nurse, I continued to reach out to members of the congregation using various media as well as personal visits to homes, hospitals and rehab centers. I offered prayer prior to surgery when needed and during personal visits. I was available for questions and as a resource, in person on Sunday mornings and by phone, text or e-mail during the week. I continued our Grief Book Ministry, with very positive feedback from those who received them.

Although the Health Ministry Team met only once this year, they were behind the scenes helping with programs and supporting the Health Ministry mission. I would like to thank our members: Eileen Schult, Carol Lieberman,

Elaine Tarantino, Lorna Kelly, Kelly Casario and Don Ballard. Health Ministry would not continue without your dedication and assistance.

I continued to be a part of the Faith Community Nurse Network, sponsored by Morristown Medical Center/Atlantic Health System. Through meetings and educational opportunities, I networked with other churches and health ministry teams and was fed spiritually, as well. I look forward to continuing a relationship with this group, as led by Gary Myers, PhD, MDiv, Manager of Faith and Health at MMC.

I want to thank Kathy for communicating the needs of the congregation to me as she receives them, and for personally and professionally supporting and encouraging me in health ministry. Kathy is an important asset of Health Ministry.

I would like to encourage anyone with feedback or suggestions to please contact me or any member of the Health Ministry Team. I look forward to continuing as TLC's parish nurse, and to encouraging each member to take personal responsibility for his or her lifestyle choices to achieve optimum health and well-being.

The 2016 year was a rough financial journey for Faith Kitchen. Donations were down and expenses had been overrun in 2014 and 2015, both leaving us in a challenging position. There was a point when Faith Kitchen was down to a minimal amount in our checking account and had a limited period of time left to be able to cover our expenses. It could well have been our final year. Then a blessing came. In the Bible, Matthew (6:31-32) teaches us: "Therefore do not be anxious, saying, 'What shall we eat?' or 'What shall we drink?' or 'What shall we wear?' For the Gentiles seek after all these things, and your heavenly Father knows that you need them all." In the final months of 2016, we were fortunate to receive a number of generous donations from individuals including some wonderful support from Trinity church members. We also landed some grants and we were able to run some collection drives to reduce our monthly expenses. We finished the year with about \$33,000 in our checking. That may sound like a lot of money (and it is) but our annual budget is about \$70,000 so we generally need to carry a decent amount in our checking account. We are greatly relieved though that at this point, we are at least on stable ground.

Faith Kitchen participated in the annual Trinity Church Alternative Gift Fair. Members of Trinity Church came upstairs after mass that day to do their annual giving. A number of organizations had a table set up, as did Faith Kitchen. We collected \$445 dollars of donations that day.

We had drafted a grant application to the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America (ELCA) that required submission by a Lutheran Church on our behalf. Pastor Dan Schroeder formally submitted Faith Kitchen's grant application and we were awarded the \$2,000 dollars. The grant covers the expense of purchasing Awareness Bracelets for Faith Kitchen (FK) which will be distributed to members and friends of organizations that serve at FK for a free-will offering. In addition, we were awarded the grant from Bayer Corporation for \$6,240 dollars to cover our annual expense for milk. We also received a \$2,500 donation from Alcoa, \$500 from AAA, \$1,500 from Knights of Columbus, \$500 from Hanover Insurance and \$2,000 from the Ladies Auxillary from the old St. Clare's Hospital group.

Over the course of the year, we received financial support from Church of the Savior, First Memorial, First Presbyterian, Grace Episcopal, Holy Wisdom, King of Kings, Mine Hill Presbyterian, Redeemer, Rockaway Assembly of God, Sacred Heart, Samaritan's Resurrection, St. Cecilia's, St. Peter's Episcopal, St. Vincent, United Presbyterian, Temple Adeth Shalom, Trinity Lutheran, Word of Life and Zion Lutheran. We picked up new support this year in food and monetary donations from Missy's Main Street Café in Rockaway. We continued to receive year end donations from Knights of Columbus and gift cards from Frithiof Lodge and picked up gift card support from Rockaway River Country Club.

Our surprise of the year came from St. Clare's Book Barn. They gave Faith Kitchen a donation of \$14,000 of which we are deeply grateful for. We are also appreciative for the two Trinity members that volunteer their time at St. Clare's Book Barn and put in a good word for us. This donation came at a critical time and contributed to helping us get the organization to a better financial place.

The holidays were successful with the Trinity Lutheran Church team handling Thanksgiving and St. Andrew's Greek Orthodox Church team handling Christmas Eve Day. Both churches cooked and served a wonderful turkey meal with all the fixings and made the serving area very festive and special for our guests. We had 89 in attendance on Thanksgiving and 156 in attendance on Christmas Eve Day. On Thanksgiving Day, Trinity Lutheran Church also served up meals to

seniors at the Senior Center down the street. On Christmas Eve Day we had many presents that were donated which included sweatshirts, hats and gloves for the adults and toys, hats and gloves for the kids. Keeping with their tradition, members of Trinity Lutheran Church handled the distribution of the gifts to our lunch guests on Christmas Eve Day.

Another year has come and gone - and those of us who served at Faith Kitchen during 2016 were grateful for the opportunity given to serve others. As Peter (4:10) reminds us "Each of you should use whatever gift you have received to serve others, as faithful stewards of God's grace in its various forms."

It has been a year of service and a year of wonderful gifts and most definitely a year of God's grace. We are looking ahead to a great 2017!

FOOD CUPBOARD

The Food Cupboard in Trinity Lutheran Church has been assisting local families with non-perishable food for many years. Eighty gift cards to ShopRite were distributed at Thanksgiving, and another 80 gift cards at Christmas.

FOOD CUPBOARD SHOPPERS

These shoppers purchase the best sale-priced items and any items the cupboard needs. Thanks to Carol Lieberman, Beverly Dominkowitz, Brenden Siemer, Nancee Seidel, Elaine Tarantino, Ken and Ashley Kindberg, Maira Rogers, Charlene Rollins, Kelly and Kathy Spear, Sharon Matschke, Joan Frick, Jane Kraus, Mabel Roy, Carolyn Dickson, Barbara Terreri, Jill Ryan, Jim Little, Kathy McFarland and Marie Matarazzo.

The Super Sale Shopper group is now in its ninth year. With little change in the economy in our area, the Food Cupboard is still experiencing a steady flow of clients, many needing help for the first time. One large bag of groceries per client is given every four weeks. Because of generous food contributions, we were able to give out an extra "holiday bag" at Thanksgiving and Christmas.

The e-mail network is the main means of communication with all the shoppers, sending their schedules and any updates on the needs of the Food Cupboard.

CALL COMMITTEE

The Trinity Call Committee was formed in January 2016 and consisted of six members, per synod policy. The committee began its work quickly with weekly meetings, designing interview questions and preparing for a candidate. The New Jersey Synod contacted us with a candidate on March 9, 2016. The Call Committee interviewed the candidate and recommended the candidate to the Church Council, which then met with the candidate and conducted a second interview. The evening concluded with discussion of compensation details and both the candidate and the Church Council were to discuss moving on to the next step. In the weeks following the Council interview, communication and research continued. After prayerful and careful deliberation, the Church Council determined that the candidate was not the best fit for Trinity, and chose to restart the call process. A second candidate recommendation was received from the Bishop's Office on June 14, 2016. The Call Committee interviewed the new candidate and recommended the candidate to the Church Council which met and interviewed the second candidate on August 18, 2016. The meeting concluded with both parties' decision to move on to the next step. On September 14, 2016 the candidate preached to the congregation. At a congregational meeting following worship on September 14, Pastor Fred Becker was offered the pastoral call at TLC. Pastor Fred began serving TLC on November 7, 2016 and his installation is scheduled for January 29, 2017.

- -Distribute to the congregation 30 days in advance of a special congregational meeting.
- -Call a special meeting of the congregation, tentatively in June 2017, to approve them.
- -Ratify them without change at the December 2017 annual meeting.

MUTUAL MINISTRY COMMITTEE

The Mutual Ministry Committee (MMC) was formerly known as the Personal Ministry Team. Some might be asking, "What is a Mutual Ministry Committee?" MMC's primary function is to keep the pastor and staff advised about conditions within the congregation, and to interpret to the congregation the ministry of the professional leaders and support staff. The Committee acts as a sounding board for the pastor and employed staff members, Council officers, the congregation's committees and ministry teams, and the congregation, thus affording everyone a direct avenue to discuss concerns or conflicts that may arise. The committee is accountable to, and reports directly to the Congregation Council. The committee is appointed jointly by the pastor and the president or vice president of the council. The Committee reviewed with all staff members their 2016 job description and compensation agreements. After the reviews, we submitted recommendations to the Finance Committee in preparation of the 2017 Budget. All updated job descriptions and the 2017 compensation agreements were completed for the Church Administrator, Bell Choir Director, Organist, Parish Nurse and the Sexton, and were executed by the pastor and staff member.

The Committee will officially welcome Pastor Fred at its first quarterly meeting in January.

I'd like to thank the committee for all their work and the time they devoted to the various tasks.

EDNA'S HAVEN

Edna's Haven had a busy year in 2016. We estimated 5,000 people came through our doors. With a steady visitor base of thirteen to seventeen in attendance daily, a core group of regulars has formed. With this core group, word-of-mouth has spread throughout Dover and into neighboring towns. We are receiving visitors referred to us by our regular client base.

Edna's Haven has continued to provide a safe and relaxed environment for anyone to come, enjoy a cup of coffee, and access our services. We provide targeted case management for a variety of services, some of which are as follows: St. Clare's Wellness and Recovery, Social Security, Office of Temporary Assistance, Zufall Health, Homeless Solutions, Pathways to Work, Wind of the Spirit Church, Milestone House, CARES, Veterans' Association, Community Hope, Hope House, Family Resource Network, Market Street Mission, Walmart, Shop Rite, Laundry Love, Homeless Solutions and Mental Health Association.

Edna's Haven has truly become a treatment crossroads in Dover. Three to five different agencies visit monthly for outreach purposes. CARES, a peer-to-peer support network for drug and alcohol, visits clients here regularly. In addition, Maria Lopez from Zufall Health visits twice a month for outreach and follow-up with clients. Case Managers from several agencies visit their clients, as well.

Through having a permanent presence in this town, we have established a good working relationship with the many non-profit agencies in the area. This allows for quick access to resources for our visitors, as well as a great capacity for following up on their progress. We have referred an estimated 1,000 visitors to services in the Morris County area. This summer, Mental Health Association donated money for two industrial portable air conditioners, cooling our program down during the very hot months of a New Jersey summer. Coupled with the donation of a refrigerator, we can provide cool bottles of water for our visitors.

We are still providing a movie day for our visitors on Wednesdays. Also, we now provide emergency rations of pre-made meal bags to clients who have no food. These bags are filled with a canned meal, fruit cup, granola bars, a bottle of water, utensils and napkins. We receive donations of bag lunches and fresh fruit once a month. We provide blankets and clothing for our visitors when needed. We always keep an eye out for specific items requested by guests. Edna's Haven now has a second regular volunteer who assists with visitors' needs. As a team, we greet the visitors, meet with them individually if needed, and coordinate services to ensure a well-balanced encounter. We remind our visitors that we are always here, so they can come back for further assistance and troubleshooting of any concerns they may have.

We are always appreciative of the endless support and spirit of cooperation and community we encounter here at Trinity Lutheran Church and the Mental Health Association. With a unified vision of service, Edna's Haven continues to be wonderful place for people to have their needs assessed and met on many levels, and have a constant and consistent support network available to them.
