PASTOR'S REPORT

Beloved of God,

Looking back on 2023, we experienced a year marked with the realization that things are actually pretty good. We returned to our life together in person, and continued with online meetings and worship. Most surprisingly, the technology worked! Through some concerted efforts, we heard God's word, sang God's praises, received the sacraments, learned, served and pursued a life of meaningful discipleship. And that was no mean feat in the year of our Lord 2023.

The Synod's Faithful Journey program of discernment drew towards its conclusion. But our own faithful journey is ongoing and will continue. Lutherans are the church of the reformation, and at our best, we are continually reforming. This year we examined our values and strengths. With gusto, we experimented worshipping and cooperating with neighboring congregations in new ways. Some experiments were successes, others were not; that's the nature of experiments. For all our experiments, our core mission remains the same: to be God's hands in Dover and to spreading the good news of God's love for the world here and further afield.

The need for our hunger ministry has increased as the economic climate has worsened, and the number of transients has swelled. We are fortunate that we are not burdened by the political questions regarding immigration. God charges us to treat the aliens and visitors among us as our own. So we are free to feed everyone who comes to us, without having to consider their legal status. Read more about the challenges and successes of our Food Pantry and the Faith Kitchen later in the annual report.

Worship and the music we hear have been sources of joy and quiet reflection this past year. Julie Sauder, our organist, has coaxed musical talents out of many members and visiting musicians in ways that surprise even them. The choir gradually is coming together again to sing God's praises and accompany us in worship.

This past year was most notable, as you may know, for your amazing generosity. Through your regular donations, and additional contributions toward the end of the year, we were able to do this work and ended with a small surplus. Our work in the community and around the world, through support of the ELCA, continues only through that generosity. We are a generous people, and we know that discipleship means sharing.

That sharing includes sharing time and pew space. We have practiced radical hospitality: Welcoming and sharing the gospel with people we may not agree with (or even like) is what being a follower of Christ is all about. In 2023, we continued a long tradition of radical hospitality, and with God's guidance, we will continue to so.

COUNCIL REPORT

Greetings, Trinity Lutheran Church Members!

Thanks to the generosity of our Trinity Lutheran Church family, we met all our financial commitments, and ended the year in the "black!" *Thank you!* This has allowed us to continue our various ministries, especially the Food Pantry and Faith Kitchen, where the need was significantly greater than last year.

We made several strides this year to engage our community more actively, including a service project for the Dover Public Library, participation in the Christmas parade, and a community-wide Thanksgiving Eve Service of Gratitude. We also reached out beyond our doors to our fellow Lutherans at Prince of Peace and St. Andrews.

On the "capital improvement" front:

- 1) Added new elements to improve our digital ministries further.
- 2) Replaced four first-floor toilets with "high risers."
- 3) Reworked the entry steps' railing for improved safety.
- 4) Replaced broken tiles in entry and had the vinyl floors rewaxed.

Lastly, as President, I had the opportunity to represent Trinity at a Council Retreat in February with Sara Lilja, at a District Meeting in March at Summit, at the Synod Assembly in May, and on a Zoom meeting with Bishop Tracy for lay leaders in October.

Thanks to all the Trinity family, who helped make 2023 such a wonderful year.

PARISH NURSE REPORT

With COVID evolving into something we will continue to live with, I have continued to educate and remind our members to stay safe by taking precautions and continuing to stay up-to-date on the latest vaccines for COVID, Flu and RSV. It was rewarding to see people following those precautions, and taking the initiative to stay home and mask when necessary, and notifying other members when they themselves had tested positive and may have exposed others.

As Parish Nurse, it was nice to be present with members as COVID diminished for most of the year. I was able to increase my home, hospital and rehab visits and offer blood pressure screenings during the last half of the year. We provided some transportation and meals to members in need. With an aging congregation, though, we were less able to provide transportation, but I provided information to individuals about community resources. In June, we offered a CPR course, the first one since 2019 due to the pandemic. On June 28, six members were certified in adult, child and infant CPR and using our automatic external defibrillator.

I continued to educate the congregation on various health issues through newsletter articles sent via Mailchimp. I reminded members that their Trinity family supports them during their grieving, by continuing to send a four-part grief booklet series published by Stephen Ministries, during the first year after death.

Pastor Fred and I continued to coordinate visits and exchange information to manage the congregation's health care needs. When Pastor or I needed to be away, we covered the health care needs for each other. I am grateful for Pastor Fred's support of TLC's Health Ministry, and for his support and encouragement of me as Trinity's Parish Nurse.

Kathy is another vital part of Health Ministry, and I am grateful to her for keeping me promptly informed of health needs in the congregation so I may contact members in a timely manner. The Health Ministry continues, thanks to Kathy's coordination, support and caring.

Health Ministry is a ministry to the entire congregation, and I thank each of you for your support through providing encouragement and assistance to other members in need, often without being recognized.

I look forward to continuing to serve as your Parish Nurse, and helping each of you strive for wellness in body, mind, and spirit.

WORSHIP AND MUSIC

The Worship and Music Committee, working with Pastor Fred, plans each worship service throughout the year. Extra attention is given to the Easter and Christmas seasons, when we coordinate special flower orders and palms with the florist, and decide on sanctuary decorations. The 2023 Worship and Music members are Judy Miller, David Bernauer, Jessie Andrews, Lynn Sienkiewicz, Kevin Seidel, Sandy Sheridan, Sheri Sauer, Joan Yurecsko and, of course, Pastor Fred.

Highlights and accomplishments in 2023 included:

- The Church Council directed a portion of Thrivent Choice dollars to the guest musicians' fund. A "hymn-madness" fundraiser also supported this ministry.
- We introduced new and previously sung liturgy settings in worship. Five settings were rotated throughout the year.
- Midweek Lenten services debuted at a new time, in person on Wednesdays at 430 p.m. and available on YouTube.
- New paraments and banners were donated or purchased.
- We hosted Prince of Peace, Denville, for Holy Week worship.
- Holy Week's special music included a guest saxophonist, soloists from the congregation, and an Easter Sunday brass ensemble.
- Summer Dinner Church returned.
- We introduced Summer Traveling Church with participation by Prince of Peace, Denville; St. Andrew's, Parsippany; and Trinity.
- Members of the congregation and guests offered weekly special music throughout the summer.
- The committee oversaw minor repairs to the pipe organ.
- We enjoyed music from the Reformation Brass Quintet and Timpani.
- Thanksgiving Eve worship with the community returned.
- We transitioned to one Christmas Eve worship service, with the choir and a guest vocal quartet.
- We oversaw improvements to our worship technology that included the ability to add text to our live streaming, and the return of our electronic bulletin board in the narthex.

CHANCEL CHOIR

- The schedule includes linen launderers. Currently three volunteers rotate the responsibilities.

ADVOCACY

In 2023, through articles written by Rev. Sara Lilja and Lutherans Engaging in Advocacy in New Jersey (LEAMNJ) Trinity had the opportunity each week to take an in-depth look at one of seven advocacy topics: Environmental Justice, Food Security Justice, Health Care & Mental Health Justice, Housing Justice, LGBTQIA Justice, Migration Justice, and Racial Justice.

The New Jersey Synod sends an advocacy "blurb" or "newsletter" to congregations, each addressing one of these topics. It includes a short explanation why the topic not only is important, but how it is supported by ELCA, addressed in New Jersey, and, sometimes, dealt with nationally. Informative resources on the topic, and actions we can take are suggested through Internet links. The articles conclude with "Hot Topics," highlighting two justice areas and detailing developments in our state, and how we can become involved. By publishing these articles in TLC's weekly newsletter, our congregation stays informed so we can become more engaged in advocacy for ourselves and others.

LIVING FOR GIVING (L4G)

MISSION STATEMENT: Living 4 Giving is a group of Christians from Trinity Lutheran Church, Dover, New Jersey. L4G encourages the church membership to be aware of societal needs by providing various opportunities to serve within our church, local, as well as worldwide communities. It can be in the form of service, or gifts of tangible items and/or monetary gifts.

The year 2023 was one of outreach to locally identified needs, and projects supporting those who suffered from intense spring storms; local day laborers; Dover's children, who now have new books to read; and seafarers, who will enjoy the items in their Christmas satchels. Following is an accounting of Trinity's Living 4 Giving's chosen projects:

- "Souper Bowl Sunday" is celebrated by gathering non-perishable items for TLC Food Pantry. This year, the Food Pantry team compiled a "suggested items list." Trinity members were encouraged to take a list when shopping, so that most-needed pantry items would be purchased.
- Lent had our congregation focusing on Zufall, an organization serving the needy living and working in Morris County. Zufall's clients, benefiting from this project were day laborers who work on local farms or for landscapers. We collected

- cleansing wipes, sunscreen, long-sleeved T-shirts, hats, socks, rain ponchos and umbrellas. Some \$381 in donations purchased additional needed items.
- Mother's Day and Father's Day were combined for one outreach focus: Those impacted by tornadoes and storms that ravaged the south and upper central plain states. We raised \$903, which was sent to Lutheran Disaster Relief to aid families who had lost their homes and belongings.
- Summer's "Pick an Apple; Buy a Book" project turned out to be a congregation favorite. "Apples" with titles and authors of early childhood and young adult books and authors were picked from a "tree," and 104 books were purchased, donated, displayed, and celebrated at a get-together Dover Public Library's children's section.
- Advent: Christmas satchels for seafarers were taken and filled by our congregation. Each contained a sweatshirt, T-shirt, knitted hat, three pairs of socks, a large chocolate or health bar and a can of nuts. The Pie and Dessert Auction's proceeds and other monetary gifts completed the filling of 73 satchels, which were delivered to the collection depot at First Lutheran Church in Clifton. A check for more than \$200 was sent to Seafarers International House to complete other unfinished satchels.

Throughout the year, as a loving, generous congregation, we shared our abundance with those who struggle to keep warm, put food on the table, placed books in children's hands, and helped give comfort and joy to seafarers far from home. You have given and continue to give your support, your heart, and your love. *You*, Trinity, are the gift. Thank you.

A total of \$1,400. was donated, and maintained in a "Fruit for Greystone" account. Greystone and its patients greatly appreciate our generosity and support. Please keep them in your prayers.

FOOD PANTRY

The Trinity Food Pantry continued its mission, as stated in Matthew 25:35: For I was hungry and you gave me something to eat, I was thirsty and you gave me something to drink, I was a stranger and you invited me in.

In 2023, the Food Pantry transitioned in its leadership roles. We are grateful for the devotion of Jane Chrashewsky and Linda Gallup during their years of active service to the Food Pantry. The new leadership team of Kurt Heinrich, Jane Kraus and Donna Johnson will do their best to maintain the high quality of care and service that Jane and Linda provided for many years.

Our food bags consist of cereal, milk, soup, vegetables, fruit, tuna, canned meat, pasta, spaghetti sauce, rice, and beans. Additionally, we include a dozen eggs, farm-fresh vegetables and frozen meat donated by Ray of Hope from restaurants and Food Pantry clients may receive two bags per month. The number of bags distributed in 2023 was 1,389 a significant 44% increase over the previous year's 965 bags.

FOOD PANTRY VOLUNTEERS

A dedicated group of volunteers distributes bags of groceries Monday through Thursday, 9 a.m. to 12:30 p.m., and Monday from 3 p.m. to 4:30 p.m., each week. Trinity's volunteers include Diana L., Joan Y., Liz S., Earl and Teresa B., Sandy D., Beverly D., Mabel R., Carol S., Marie M., Sheri S., Mike and Suzanne C., Elaine and Gary T., Sharon M., Jane K., Sandy S., Pauline C., Kurt H., Meg M. We also rely on community volunteers, including Marian M., Carol J., Maria B., Kathy C., Eliana V., Ruben G., Natalie S., and Andres S. Without these great folks, we would never be able to do this valuable ministry. Thank you all.

FOOD PANTRY SHOPPERS

With an increased demand for food, we have relied upon our shoppers to do more shopping than previously. We also thank Judy Miller for providing us with bread, and Sandy Dean for shopping for eggs each week. A special thanks goes to Kathy McFarland, who frequently shops, and helps the Food Pantry Ministry in many ways.

2023 FINANCIAL DONATIONS

Monetary donations to the Food Pantry are made through TLC's Local Hunger campaign. In 2023, \$16,582 was received. Food purchases of \$21,635 were made during the year.

2023 FOOD DONATIONS

The Food Pantry also thrives through donations of food, both large and small, from TLC members, partner churches, local businesses, and community residents. Special thanks go to groups such as Local Share, Ray of Hope and Connect for Community, who collect donations of meat, eggs and produce from restaurants, farmers' markets, and farmers themselves for the Food Pantry. The Girls Scouts of Morris County also donated 80 cases of cookies.

During special occasions like Thanksgiving, food has been donated from area schools' food drives, an automobile dealership, and local businesses. This Advent, TLC members and friends collected over 25 bags of food as a devotional practice of the season.

HEALTH KITS

Health Kits are distributed to Food Pantry and Faith Kitchen clients once per month. The kits include soap, toothpaste, a toothbrush, a razor, shampoo for women and shaving cream for men. These items are donated by generous TLC folks and community members. Additionally, Thrivent Action Team members: Lynn Sienkiewicz, Sheri Sauer, Gary Tarantino, Nancee Seidel, Carol Schwarz, Beth Barrett, and Jane Kraus applied for and received \$2,750 in Thrivent funds to purchase these supplies. Approximately 550 bags were distributed in 2023.

SOCKS, HATS AND GLOVES

A local businessman, Jim H., received donations from his customers of socks, knit hats, gloves and scarves to keep Food Pantry and Faith Kitchen clients warm and dry during the winter. Several churches and individuals also supported this ministry. We are grateful to these thoughtful donors.

FAITH KITCHEN

We will remember 2023 as a rewarding and successful year for Faith Kitchen. We continued to make improvements and fine-tune our functions:

- Updated our website and switched to a different carrier to save money. Our website can be accessed at www.faithkitchendover.org.
- Started daily Facebook posts, thanking the volunteer groups, showing photos of the meals and reporting the headcount. Our Facebook page can be accessed by searching for Faith Kitchen Dover.
- Arranged weekly donations of breakfast sandwiches, lunch sandwiches and desserts from the Wawa stores in Randolph and Jefferson.
- Arranged weekly donations from Kentucky Fried Chicken in Rockaway, through the volunteer group Rise-Up.
- Arranged weekly donations through a bread rescue group from Anthony & Sons Bakery in Denville.

In August, we received a donation of 3,000 pairs of socks from Bombas after a Board member had submitted an application more than a year ago; the donation arrived in September. Socks were distributed every Friday to our lunch guests. As Faith Kitchen is now a Giving Partner, we can renew the sock donation for 2024.

In October we received a lovely donation of handmade crocheted, knitted, and loomed hats and scarves from the East Hanover Senior Citizens' Club which were distributed to our lunch guests. These beautiful items were distributed on Thanksgiving and Christmas.

On Thanksgiving Day, TLC volunteers and friends prepared 163 turkey dinners with all the fixings, and pie for dessert. TLC volunteers delivered 40 meals to the senior building on East Blackwell Street. Two dozen turkeys were prepared by TLC, St. Matthew the Apostle Parish in Randolph and the United Presbyterian Church of Flanders.

We had much to be thankful for that day! A big thank you to Bill Eberly for bringing his brother Dave to play the piano for our lunch guests. Everyone enjoyed the music.

It costs approximately \$100 per day in consumables (paper plates, napkins, plasticware, toilet paper, placemats, paper towels, hot cups and lids, cold cups, etc.) to operate Faith Kitchen – that's \$600 per week or \$31,200 per year. We solicited and received grants from the Bayer Corporation, Catholic Human Services Fund and the New Jersey Synod to offset these costs.

Faith Kitchen's 1,901 volunteers served 33,112 meals in 2023.

Dan and Tina continue to be faithful Faith Kitchen assets, working hard to help our mission succeed.

Faith Kitchen continues to meet the needs of our community by providing our patrons with nutritious meals as well as access to other social services. This would not be possible without our amazing volunteers.

Thank you to Trinity Lutheran's Food Pantry volunteers, who greet our guests and perform the lunch headcount at the Faith Kitchen's door. You are appreciated!

Thank you to Trinity members who donated their Thrivent Action Team monies to Faith Kitchen.

Thank you to Kathy McFarland, who helps with milk runs and whenever there is any other need.

Thank you to Sandy Dean and her team of volunteers, who purchase, prepare and serve the meal on the second Tuesday of each month.

Thank you to Marie Matarazzo and her volunteers for providing Trinity's meal on the third Tuesday of each month, and to the TLC members who designated their Thrivent Action Teams for this cause.

Many, many thanks to TLC Council members, who volunteer every Saturday to open the building, put on the coffee, assist the volunteer groups, and greet Faith Kitchen guests. Your help is extremely appreciated.

A plumber cleared the sewer line between the toilets and the first-floor hall. He said there is a bend in the line which contributes to the back up.


A new vendor inspected the fire extinguishers in the church and the PLC and replaced two which were out of date. They also inspected the fire suppression system above the oven.
